

### President's Report by Gary Schmidt

In spite of these difficult economic times, the staff and volunteers of the Nicollet County Historical Society continue to do an outstanding job of delivering services and programs at all of our sites. It is truly amazing to observe the professionalism, dedication and pride that all take in their work. A huge THANK YOU to Ben, staff and volunteers.

For the NCHS Board of Directors it has been a fulfilling year but also a year of considerable anxiety over the challenge of keeping NCHS fiscally sound and viable. Many of our funding sources dealt with extreme budget challenges and there was always the fear that we may face considerable cut-backs in our funding. To date this has not happened and for that we are very thankful.

Looking ahead, it has become clear to me and board members that to solve the never-ending challenge of properly funding NCHS operations we must embark on a program of fund raising. This effort needs to address not only immediate needs of operations but more importantly the need to build substantial endowments. We can only achieve this goal by convincing the greater Nicollet County population and citizens beyond county borders of the value and worthiness of our organization, its mission and services. It is only then that we can expect to see substantial gains in membership, annual giving and legacy gifting of estates, trusts, grants, etc. To this we must dedicate a substantial portion of our efforts in 2010 and future years.

NCHS possesses or manages 5 sites—the Treaty Site History Center, E. St. Julien Cox House, Harkin Store, Traverse des Sioux and Fort Ridgely - all 'historic gems'. But, it is fitting that the cover photo for this annual report feature the Cox house. For 2010 the Board has taken on the challenge of studying every facet of its operations to come up with a long range plan for maximizing the Cox Houses' potential. Hopefully this effort will bear fruit for the 2011 year of operation.

Finally, please utilize the NCHS web site (www.nchsmn.org) throughout the year. It provides easy access to NCHS events, programs, research, membership, tours, newsletters, annual reports, services, etc.

Thanks to all members, staff and volunteers for your efforts and support of NCHS.

## Message from the Director, Ben Leonard

I would like to sincerely thank all of the individuals, organizations, and entities that have supported us over the years, especially over the last twelve months. It is extremely humbling to have so many good people believe in what we have done, what we can do, and how we do it. We will try to honor your gifts of financial support, time, experience, and participation in the coming year.

Evie Swenson, Julie Gilbert, and Arden DeBoer have been wonderful board members. We will miss their insight and thoughtfulness the third Tuesday of every month, but know we will continue our friendship. Thank you so much. This year marks a milestone for me personally. Evie is the last remaining board member who was serving when I was

hired. I feel lucky to have spent almost six full years under her guidance. As we say goodbye to Evie, Julie, Arden, we will welcome three new members to our group of fifteen. I could not be happier with the board we have, and the contemplative monthly discussions.

Special thanks to Nicollet County, the City of St. Peter, Brighton and West Newton Township. It can't be an easy decision to fund the Society in today's economic climate. The fact that they do says a lot about their commitment to our shared heritage and quality of life. I can honestly say that I believe the Society is a better steward of taxpayer dollars today than we have ever been.

We are more financially accountable with solid record-keeping practices and an independently audited 2008 financial statement. Though we rely heavily on these dollars to operate, government allocations are a smaller percentage of our overall budget than they were 5 years ago. Local taxpayers fund the Society less than 75 cents for each person we serve. The Minnesota Historical Society costs state taxpayers more than \$3.50 since each. We will continue to find ways to most efficiently allocate our resources and more creative ways to generate revenue.

The past year we've done just that. We have leased an office at the Treaty Site History Center to the Minnesota Literacy Council. The partnership fits nicely into our mission and financially contributes to our bottom line. The Society is currently working on a curriculum partnership with the St. Peter School District. State standards based interactive lessons on Traverse des Sioux, the Treaty, and Fort Ridgely will be available to teachers and students through the internet.

NCHS received an Award of Merit from the American Association for State and Local History in August for the Treaty Site History Center's central exhibit renovation.








### NCHS as a Whole in 2009







Average Minnesota County Historical Society Revenue and Expense in 2005 (last year available)

NICOLLET COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

Sunday, January 18, 2009

The Nicollet County Historical Society membership convened for its annual meeting at Gustavus Adolphus College, St. Peter, MN on Sunday, January 18, 2009 at 1 pm.

President LaVonne Craig welcomed the group and called Herb Poncin for the Invocation. Members then enjoyed a delicious meal served by the Gustavus dining staff.

#### I. Call to Order

President LaVonne Craig called the annual business meeting to order at 2:00 pm. The President thanked the dining service staff for their work.

#### II. Board and Staff Introductions

President Craig invited Executive Director Ben Leonard to introduce the staff and Board of Directors. Ben thanked President Craig and Board member Ed Wetherill, both outgoing, for their years of service to the Board.

#### III. Secretary's Report

The 2008 annual meeting minutes were presented as printed on pages 15 & 16 of the 2008 Annual Report. There being no additions or corrections, the President called for a motion to approve the minutes as written. M/S Don Gustafson/Marilyn Roberts. Motion carried.

#### IV. Treasurer's Report

Treasurer Herb Poncin reported on the water problems that plagued the Treaty Site this year. Repairs to the building cost \$17,000. The Society borrowed money to pay for the repairs, using a \$25,000 CD at First National Bank as collateral. Another CD maturing in the fall was intended to pay off the loan but the Society cold only pay off \$10,000 on the loan and extend \$15,000 for the following year.

The Endowment Fund is down approximately \$58,000 from last year and currently is at \$100,000. Herb reported that we do not want it to get any lower. Staff have streamlined operations as much as possible, including involving current staff in doing more of the financial and building maintenance work, which will help keep costs down.

A motion was called to accept the Treasurer's Report. M/S Evie Swenson/Diane Stenson. Motion carried.

#### V. Director's Report

Executive Director Ben Leonard directed everyone's attention to the financial data presented in the 2008 Annual Report for a more detailed look at the Society's finances.

Ben thanked the staff and Board for their work.

Ben reviewed the Director's Report on page 3 of the 2008 Annual Report. Highlights include the renovation of the main gallery, renovations at Harkin and the planned construction of new trails at Fort Ridgely, slated to begin this spring. Ten thousand photographs are searchable on the NCHS website and many images are also available at the Minnesota Digital Reflections website as well, meaning the Society is serving people online as well as in person.

President LaVonne Craig highlighted many of the activities related to local history occurring in the area,

The Cox House committee started the year without a site manager. In March, we welcomed 3 new members to our committee-Susan Stenson, Jennifer Baxa, and Steve Baxa. Steve agreed to be our board liaison.

In April the board cut back the open hours to Friday-Sundays, 1:00-4:00 only. Admission charge was raised to \$4 for adults, \$2 for children 7-17 years old, and younger children free. An intern, Maggie Gleason was hired for site manager.

Maggie Gleason started her internship on May 23rd and ended it at the end of July. Jessica Becker manned the house until the end of August. The committee had hoped to have a manager on hand to help with the plant sale, planning programming and the Christmas open house. The committee prepared the house for the opening. Ben hired a cleaning lady to do the heavy work.

Events: May 16th: Annual Heritage Plant Sale. 8:30-2:00 pm on the Cox House lawn. We took in a total of \$1,595. We had about 30 plant donors and 30 volunteers. May 23rd-25th: A display of fans and house tours. Opening weekend. May 25th: A program about fans arranged by Ben Leonard. Low attendance. Guests were welcomed by Maggie Gleason. Fans were important during the Victorian era because dining was often done at long tables where it was hard to carry on a conversation and guests could communicate with the language of fans. June 20th: An Afternoon of Parlour Music at the E. St. Julien Cox House. Marilyn Robertz did an excellent job planning and carrying out this wonderful program. About 25 guests and the performers all enjoyed the Victorian style music and most participated in a sing-a-long. Cookies and lemonade were served in the garden. June 28th: American Girl Tea Party. Maggie Gleason planned and carried out this very special event. About 25 guests attended. The girls brought their own American Girl Dolls to the tea party. Fancy tea food was served and appropriate items were added to the Victorian décor. Maggie is an excellent hostess. Sept. 4th-6th: Cox House Yard Sale. This was an antique & miscellaneous yard sale located on the lawn of the Cox House. This was a joint event with local antique dealers, private dealers, and the Cox House Committee. The house was open for tours. The Cox House took in \$533.35. This money will go toward the Cox House gardens and house. Dec. 5th & 6th, Dec. 12th & 13th: A Victorian Christmas at the Cox House, an annual event. This year the Questers chose the theme of "Doll Houses." Seven different styles of houses were on display. Total attendance was 238 people for the two weekends, 243 children and chaperons for the school tours, and a family tour for 12 people made the total attendance 493 people. Total revenues was \$414. Members and school children were free. 21 volunteers served as hosts and 20 musicians provided the music for the two weekends. This was a very successful and enjoyable event.

Acquisitions: <u>A painting of the Cox House</u> was donated to the Nicollet County Historical Society for use at the Cox House by the father of Jenny Powers. Jenny is the great, great granddaughter of Judge Cox. It was painted in 1970 by Lillian Gault's daughter (Jenny's aunt). It is an example of folk art and shows where the carriage house was originally standing and the later screen porch. It is now displayed at the Cox House. <u>A unique 1860 rocking chair</u> was donated by Josephine A. Regan, the daughter of Cecelia K. Engesser Fay and granddaughter of Joseph Engesser. The chair is on display at the Cox House.





The staff at Fort Ridgely Historic Site sends you warm winter greetings. During the season when the staff is at the commissary, we will comment on how did the soldiers and their families survive on the MN prairie? For soldiers and other residents that lived at the military post we think of how they had to endure the summer months with the heat and bugs or in the winter with the snow and bitter winds. As staff on a one to one basis or to visiting groups, we try to share what life would have been like during the mid 19<sup>th</sup> century at a remote military fort. To enhance and help boost our attendance, we have independent vendors share history or nature related programs at the site.

In 2009 the Military Encampment and Roger Breckenridge in June, and Gary Revier in August shared their knowledge of military life for soldiers during the era that Fort Ridgely would have been an active site. The kite fly during the Military Encampment was a crowd pleaser and is always wonderful to see the huge kites dance and bend above the Fort Ridgely parade ground.

The Y.E.S. (Youth Entertainment Saturday) was a staff developed program for the Labor Day weekend. The activities were geared for youth but adults were good sports and also participated. Visitors made fresh butter, made pressed flower bookmarks and tried their hand at some old-fashioned games. The activities will be incorporated as part of the 2010 season on a regular basis.

Ron Bouldan and Roger Breckenridge have agreed to return to the commissary to share new programs with visitors at the site. Ron will join us on June 6, 2010 for Open House Sunday and Roger's date is yet to be announced.

To help save budget money, the Military Encampment weekend has been cancelled for the 2010 season. Hopefully it will be reinstated in the future.
